

The Soul Justice Project: An interdisciplinary performance event to combat the silencing of marginalized voices

Mesa, AZ – Best known in Greater Phoenix as an organization that employs spoken word to empower young people, Phonetic Spit will present *The Soul Justice Project* in Mesa Arts Center's Piper Theater on May 1 at 8:00 p.m. Tickets are \$22 and are available at mesaartscenter.com or by calling 480-644-6500.

In its inaugural performance event, *The Soul Justice Project* will use Newspaper Theatre – a branch of Augusto Boal's theatrical form, Theatre of the Oppressed – along with a fusion of spoken word, live

music, movement and true, personal narratives to shine a light on polarizing issues currently in the headlines.

Boal developed his version of Newspaper Theatre in 1971 in Brazil with the goal of using the news as a frame for exploring and addressing issues of social justice. The goal of *The Soul Justice Project* in using this format is to use the arts to humanize issues that are challenging to discuss and to create a platform and safe space for dialogue. Artistic Director Tomas J. Stanton said of the project, "We're not naïve enough to believe that this show will change the world, but we do believe in the power of words to ignite first steps."

Toward that goal, *The Soul Justice Project* will engage local organizations, such as the Isac Amaya Foundation, to be available before and after the show to provide factual information around issues illuminated in the performance. Post-performance, audience members are invited to join in a community dialogue wherein they can ask questions and learn about opportunities to take direct action, if so desired.

Stanton is working collaboratively with numerous Valley-based artists and educators to develop the performance. Collaborators include: Xanthia Walker, director; Sydney Jackson, choreographer and stage manager; Liliana Gomez, choreographer and dancer; Jay Bouey and Ashley Baker, dancers; and Joy Young and Myrlin Hepworth, poets.

A portion of the proceeds from the performance will be donated to the Isac Amaya Foundation, an organization created to guide and provide financial resources for students, regardless of their immigration status, to achieve a higher education.

Mesa Arts Center is located at One East Main Street in downtown Mesa.
