National Geographic Live Presents On the Trail of Big Cats Photographer Steve Winter Wednesday, October 15



Mesa, AZ – The 2014-15 *National Geographic Live* Arizona Speaker Series kicks off with **awardwinning wildlife photographer Steve Winter** at Mesa Arts Center on Wednesday, October 15 at 7:30 p.m. in the Ikeda Theater. Winter will bring audience members dangerously close to tigers, snow leopards, jaguars, and cougars, through his unforgettable stories and images.

Winter's talk will highlight the dangerous and lighter moments of his journey to save big cats, from being attacked by rhinos to mishaps with remote-controlled cameras. Despite the dangers and challenges of working in the field, Winter continues on his mission to share the beauty of big cats while reinvigorating efforts to save them. His organization Panthera works with National Geographic's <u>Big Cats Initiative</u> to develop and implement global strategies for saving these majestic but endangered creatures.

Winter is also co-author of the National Geographic book, *Tiger's Forever: Saving the World's Most Endangered Cat,* and his photography garnered him a BBC Wildlife Photographer of the Year award, as well as recognition as BBC Wildlife Photojournalist of the Year.
