With a passion for preserving marine life and its ecosystem, Earle's talk will highlight the beauty and magnificence of the ocean, as well as how we can continue to responsibly enjoy the resources it has to offer.

Earle is the founder of the Mission Blue Foundation, she was named *Time* magazine's first Hero for the Planet, Chair of the Advisory Council for the Harte Research Institute and the Marine Science and Technology Foundation, former Chief Scientist of NOAA, a "Living Legend" by the Library of Congress, and a 2009 winner of the TED Prize. Earle has pioneered research on marine ecosystems and has led more than 100 expeditions.
